
Foreword



BOARD OF EDUCATION

THE Board of Education is the final governing authority of our school system. These board members are elected by the taxpayers of Hempstead, who help to finance our schools. These chosen citizens are capable business and professional men who have the interest of the schools at heart. These skilled and experienced directors try to run the schools to the best of their ability while at the same time avoiding unreasonable expenditure of the public money entrusted to their good judgment.

On the third Thursday of each month the Board of Education meets regularly. Whenever unexpected emergencies or needs for immediate decisions arise, they assemble before the regularly appointed meetings. These meetings are held in the School Superintendent's Office, at the high school. During these friendly meetings which are sometimes extended and exhaustive, the members of the board usually happily and unanimously solve problems which are brought up for their careful consideration.

Since these efficient public-spirited citizens give freely of their time taken from their private businesses, the tax-payers appreciate their guidance and fair decisions. Even the least appreciative pupil in the Hempstead Schools must honestly confess that our School Board has been most generous with building additions and fine new equipment. The rehabilitation of the Band Box and the enlargement of the girls' athletic field are at the top for future plans.


When Dr. Kincaid takes time from his school planning, we find him displaying the same vigorous enthusiasm for his favorite sports: golf, badminton and fishing.













From Office III Dr. Maure, Principal, supervises the entire educational program for the school. At the same time he somehow manages to keep well informed as to the individual interests of both students and teachers. All arrangements pertaining to substitute teachers are handled by his secretaries.

In Office II there is never a dull moment. Mr. Pill, Director of the Guidance Department, among other duties interviews all freshmen with their parents. Miss MacDougall in a personal interview plans schedules with all sophomores. Mr. Turnbull takes over the guidance of the commercial and general course students when they reach their junior year. Mrs. Hueston, Registrar, also assists the college preparatory students in their junior and senior years. Mrs. Walter, school psychologist, works in connection with this office. She gives special tests and follows up with recommendations regarding all individuals referred to her.

Dr. Kincaid, Superintendent, and his Office Staff in Office I and I-A deal with the enormous quantity of business involved in the smooth management of the entire Hempstead School system. Mrs. Hardy, business manager of all these offices, from long experience knows all the answers to so many problems. She, with the help of her able assistants, collects tuition for the non-resident students, manages the pay rolls, makes state reports, approves purchasing orders, and keeps track of all cafeteria and activity funds. All these and many other duties keep this office humming with activity.

Mr. E. C. Moore, director of the Audio-Visual Department, is located in Office 18A with his large store of machines and equipment. This is a rapidly growing department which reaches out into every building of the school system.

To our capable administrators we are indebted for our well-organized and carefullyplanned opportunities.




While these Latin Students in their seats work industriously on their class work Miss Winter is giving a helping hand to her interested students at the blackboard.



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

From this busy group comes the plans for the annual goodwill gesture—the Senior Frosh Party, entirely a girls' affair.






GIRLS' COLOR GUARD

The end of their reign as county champions came in the 1949 season when they played eight games, winning one, losing five, and tying two.

twenty yard line when the half ended and with it the Tiger's touchdown hopes. In the third and fourth quarters Hempstead was forced to play defensive ball. Although both teams had scoring chances, they couldn't gather the needed punch to reach paydirt, and the score ended in a 0-0 tie.

Sewanhaka was forced to come from behind to gain a tie with Hempstead. Hempstead opened the attack in the second quarter, moving the ball 54 yards across the field for the first score. Sewanhaka scored on several passes in the third quarter. The highlight of the game was Hempstead's goal line stand in the third quarter. The game ending in a 6-6 tie marked the second year these two teams played a tie.

The Tigers just couldn't get started against the mighty Chaminade team. From the opening kick off the Flyers shifted into high gear, and on the first two offensive plays scored a touchdown. Their effective passing and superb running continued to give them a 25-0 bulge at the end of the first quarter. From there on they

coasted to victory. The only bright spot for Hempstead was Jack Hemberger's 89 yard return of a kickoff. In a rather one-sided game Chaminade defeated Hempstead 32-6.

The White Plains eleven got off to a flying start, by driving 78 yards in the opening minutes to the Hempstead goal line. In a hectic first half they ran up to a 24-0 lead. They continued their running and passing to boost their lead to five touchdowns in the third quarter. Although Danny O'Brien scored two touchdowns, the Plainsmen coasted to a 32-14 victory.

Still looking for a win Hempstead took on the Mineola Maroons. Showing a lot of power and speed the Tigers jumped ahead, scoring two touchdowns in the first quarter. With a touchdown in the third quarter and one more in the fourth they led 26-0 going into the final minutes of the game. But the determined Maroons were not to be counted out. They scored twice on long passes before they accepted defeat at the hands of Hempstead, by the score of 26-14.

With the football season nearing a close, Hempstead faced the undefeated Glen Cove Team. The winner of this game was to receive the H. H. Chapman Memorial Bell. Glen Cove got the early jump and scored first blood. They went on to smash the Hempstead line and gain a 20-0 lead. The Tigers countered with an aerial attack making the score 20-6. From then on, Glen Cove, with a comfortable lead held their own. In a game packed with excitement Glen Cove emerged victorious over Hempstead 33-20.

On Thanksgiving Day Hempstead played their last game of the season against Brooklyn Tech. The first half was a bitterly waged battle with neither team scoring. Three times Brooklyn Tech came within the Tiger's ten yard line, but each time they were turned back by a stubborn Hempstead team. In the third quarter the Brooklynites scored due to an untimely fumble. Hempstead came close to scoring in the fourth quarter but lost the ball on downs. For the first time in three years Hempstead lost to Brooklyn Tech by the score of 7-0.

Although Hempstead finished the season with a poor record they need not be depressed by their deeds on the football field. All through the year they showed good sportsmanship, and the willingness to try their best for the honor of the school.

Now the Tigers may put away their uniforms and rest, with the consolation that next year many of the green players will be ready to challenge and beat this year's victors.

Coach Benner believes that next year's prospects are bright as we will have many promising "J. V." candidates and several returnees from the varsity.




VARSITY BASEBALL

TRACK TEAM

T RACK today is a combination of the ancient sport in which men competed against each other in feats of skill and endurance and the competition of men against records. The contestant in a present day track meet is always competing against some previous records, just as a golf player plays against the par for a certain course. The 1949 Hempstead High School Track Team proved outstanding against both its opponents and previous track records.

Hempstead opened the 1949 season by defeating Chaminade 57-47. They also defeated Valley Stream Central 551/2-481/2. The only loss of the season was the meet with Mepham resulting in a 60-44 defeat. In a triangular meet Hempstead won over Sewanhaka and Freeport. In this meet Sewanhaka scored 43-7/12. Freeport scored 18-5/12, while Hempstead's score was 68.

Hempstead was unfortunate in losing first place in the South Shore Athletic League Championship by only 1/2 point. This loss was caused by the disqualification of our relay team. But one must realize that this same relay team set the new 440 Relay Record at 45:1 at the Nassau County Relays. At this same meet Hempstead took second in the Shuttle Hurdle Title and a fourth in the Two Mile Relay.

Hempstead gained third place in the Nassau County Championships.

A group of boys which made up the nucleus of the 1949 team, were taken up to West Point, New York, by Mr. Krause, where they entered in a Sectional Meet. At this event Fred Banta, the captain of the team, took both seconds in the 100 and 200 yard dashes. Lee Dluginski scored a third in the Hurdles while Al Kohanowich scored second in the High Jump.

It has always been the aim of Hempstead teams to break previous records and this 1949 team has certainly lived up to the standards of Hempstead High School trackmen.



RIFLE TEAM



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
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CUSTODIANS


After the serving of the ice cream, cake and soda, the room hummed with friendly chatter.

A plan must be determined by which Asiatic countries can play a part in the world's economy. The United States should give Asia some aid so that she will benefit by educational and scientific progress.

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
