## Board of Education

THE backbone of our school system is the Board of Education. Its function is to give the utmosi attention to all problems and policies relating to the Hempstead schools and to make fair and important decisions. The Board is assisted by Dr. W. Amos Kincaid, the Superintendent of Schools.

There are five members on the Board, one member of which is elected each year by the tax-paying citizens of the Village of Hempstead. The term for each member is flve years. Each officer is nominated and elected by the members of the Board of Education itsel. With the assistance of a clerk and an attorney, the five members meet regularly once a month in the superintendent's office, here at Hempstead High School. There are also special meetings called whenever the occasion arises.

In the main, the Board of Education works out any problem which may arise and makes final decisions on any and all policies which affect the running of the school. The Board is also entrusted with the expenditure of a great deal of money which is used wisely in maintaining the high level of the Hempstead schools.

Our heartiest congratulations to the Board of Education for its generous service and devotion to education.

ASSISTING our principal are three people who are an important part of Hempstead High's administration. First on the list is Mr. Windt, the Assistant to the Principal. Although he is in charge of discipline and attendance, Mr. Windt also supervises all extracurricular activities, athletic finances, and maintains the records pertaining to the point system. Teaching math and general science was Mr. Windt's job when he firsi came to Hempstead. His interest in maih continued, and he became co-author of the book Everyday Algebra. Busy as he is, Mr. Windt finds time tc enjoy his hobbies which include various sports. $\mathrm{H}_{\mathrm{c}}$ is a loyal Yankee fan.

Most academic students are familiar with Mr. Pill, the guidanse director, whose official title is Director of Pupil Personnel Services of the Public Schools of Hempstead. However, his main job is primarily concerned with pre-college students. Mr. Pill feels that the important function of pre-college guidance is to send the student to a college which will suit his individual needs. Besides helping the seniors to decide whai college to attend after leaving Hempstead, Mr. Pill and his assistants also advise all other students except sophomores and ron-academic juniors and seniors. Included in his staff are secretarial assistants.

As curriculum coordinator, Mr. Moore is concerned with the courses of study in the high school and the elementary schools of Hempstead. Through his depar:ment the work of the grade schools is integrated with that of the high school. In doing so, the department decides whai subjects the grade schools must offer in order to prepare the students for high school work. Mr. Moore is also the director of Audio-Visual Education which is an important supplement to our subjects.

English

Included in the curriculum for seniors who qualify, there are special advanced English classes. Courses in creative writing are also offered. Our English Department, headed by Miss Barth, provides a well-rounded study of literature, grammar and other phases of English.

0. the atom, mathematics has become so very important to our civilization.

Six different math courses are offered in our school curriculum. A student of Hempstead High can receive an education in elementary algebra, the study of quantity in terms of formulas or equations, and plane geometry, the study of flat surfaces, in his freshman and sophomore years respectively. In his junior and senior years, four half-year courses are available to him. They are intermediate algebra, trigonometry, the study of the right triangle, solid geometry, the study of solid figures, and advanced algebra.

Mathematics teaches us how to comprehend, how to reason and how to come to a scientific or practical conclusion.

The students who receive this mathematical knowledge possess a basis for more complex s'udies and also es:ablish a foundation for such professions as atomic research and engineering to name just two of many.

Over twenty-five courses designed to develop skill and technique in operating industrial machines are offered the students in industrial arts.

Six shops and a drafting room are maintained with the finest equipment possible. To guide the pupils is a staff of five members, skillfully trained to start the pupils of indusirial arts on fine careers.

## Driver Education

"SAFETY and courtesy to other drivers and pedestrians," stresses Mr. White, "is the motto of the juniors and seniors taking Driver Education.

Three times a week the students meet in the classroom where discussion, reports, and movies are presented. Once a week they are on the road. Also on the program are visits to traffic courts, and garages. They conduct traffic surveys and take tests for physical abilities and reactions.

## Fitness

THE Health and Physical Education Departments are an essential element in maintaining the physical fitness of the student.

The Health Department gives every student a physical examination at the beginning of the year. It also gives assistance whenever anyone is ill. Examinations are given again when one goes out for a sport or wants working papers.

This year with the attendance reduced in gym classes, participants in physical education were able to engage in more individual activities.

With the boys, the year is started off by playing touch football followed by basketball. Next comes wrestling and tumbling. In the spring, track and softball are the predominant sports.

In the girls' gym some of the important activities are basketball and softball. But the most exciting and important of all activities is the preparation for Greek Games. The girls train long and thoroughly until each event is perfected.

With the excellent facilities that the Health and Physical Education Departments offer the student is given every chance not only to build muscles, but also to mold fine characters.

ACORPS of efficient and helpful clerks and secretaries is found in the various administrative and counseling offices of the school. Thoroughly acquainted with office and secretarial matters, they have at their finger tips all necessary information. Consequently, it is an easy matter to obtain any information concerning the school or a particular student. Summer work for them goes on at the same pace.
