Together with Dr. W. Amos Kincaid, Superintendent of Schools, and Margaret E. Doty, District Clerk, the Board meets once a month. The five members who make up the Board are elected by the taxpayers from our school district for a term of five years. A new member is chosen each year for this term.

Our thanks to the Board of Education for the fine work it has done for our school, our school district, and the education of our students.
