








FOREWORD






MR. HENRY SCHAEDEL

In posting notices of club meetings and other important student functions, Mrs. Gaffga's bulletin board staff performs an indispensable service to our school.




The squad originally consisted of twelve girls, but, due to a strict set of rules formulated this year, some of them had to forfeit their positions because of low school grades. There were many basketball games

Inspiring a spirit of teamwork and sportsmanship was the main purpose of the club. This combination of attitudes can often result in a victory over a more talented opponent.


