




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

To Dr. Amos Kincaid we proudly dedicate this book with the assurance to him of our support, loyalty, and unanimity of spirit.




Foreword



DR. W. AMOS KINCAID
Superintendent of Schools

IN Office I there is a new person who fills the very difficult position of Superintendent of Schools. This is Dr. W. Amos Kincaid who has taken over the direction of the Hempstead Schools.

The Doctor, a Rotarian, is well qualified for this new position as Superintendent. He received his Bachelor of Arts Degree from Ohio State University, and after spending one year as Principal and two as Superintendent of Schools in Ohio, he attended Teachers College at Columbia University. In 1930 he became Superintendent of Schools at Montpelier, Vermont, where he remained until 1941. After leaving Vermont, he held the same position in Summit, New Jersey, and in the Spring of 1946 the degree of Doctor of Education was conferred upon him. Then he came to Hempstead to lead our school system.

In his plans for Hempstead High, he has in mind a total guidance program for all students. In this program, which has worked very successfully in other schools, the personal problems of each pupil are discussed with him, and he is advised by a competent teacher. Also, Superintendent Kincaid is extremely interested in the summer camp program, believing that this activity is one way in which schools may help combat juvenile delinquency. In addition, he believes that more physical and health education will aid in the character development of our students.

We all wish the utmost success for our new Superintendent in his plans for us. We hope that he will enjoy many happy days at Hempstead in his new role.



DR. MAURE, who has served as Principal of Hempstead High School since 1921, is admirably fitted for his position, not only because of his extensive education, but because of his diversified activities in other fields.


Upon completing high school in Oneonta, New York, he attended Wesleyan University, later obtaining his Bachelor of Science and Master of Arts degrees in Alfred University. Post graduate courses at Rutgers and Columbia Universities followed his attendance at Teachers College, supplementing all with additional courses at New York University, where he earned his degree of Doctor of Education.

Dr. Maure's experience includes two years as vice-principal and instructor of science in Fulton High School, Fulton, New York, and principal of Liberty Corner Elementary School, Bernardsville, New Jersey.

During the war years he served as Chairman of the National War Fund Drive and publicity director of the British War Relief Drive. The Consultative Committee of Youth Conference, the War Finance Committee of Nassau County, the National Education Association, New York State Teachers Association, and the National Congress of Parents and Teachers number Dr. Maure among their members. Nassau County has benefited from his assistance in organizing the first body of DeMolay and a training group for Boy Scout Leaders.

Bowling, tennis, and clam-digging are his favorite recreations but his greatest hobby is the Student Body.

Dr. Maure is greatly respected and admired, not only for his friendliness and considerate administration of the affairs of his office, but also for the keen understanding of the problems and needs of those who look to him for guidance.

OFFICE I

In this office is conducted the important business of the Board of Education and the Hempstead Schools. Some of the important duties of this office are as follows: preparing various state reports; keeping civil service records; withholding tax on school incomes; and preparing the district pay rolls.

Together with its original staff and the new members, Office I will continue to serve the schools in its usual efficient manner. We all appreciate their services to us.

OFFICE IA

THIS office was started in 1946 because Office I had too many things to do and not enough time or space in which to do them. This is a rather small office, but very competent and business-like in its dealings. Office IA is concerned with such matters as: securing working papers, purchasing supplies for the Hempstead Public Schools, and tuition fees from non-resident students.

The office is supervised by Edith E. Schwedes and Jeanette R. Siegmann. Mrs. Siegmann, who is the account clerk, is in charge of the Cafeteria Fund and the High School Activities Fund. Miss Schwedes is also a notary public. As in the other offices, the supervisors of Office IA are assisted by girl students from the commercial department who help out during free periods. With this very capable staff, Office IA has managed well this year.

OFFICES II AND III

OFFICE II is divided into two separate divisions. Dr. Maure, our Principal, and his secretaries occupy the office which assembles the school curriculum and the extra-curriculum. All final decisions as to the policies of the school are made here.

The other part of Office II regulates class schedules. Mrs. Hueston, our registrar, and her staff enroll each student and file all schedules. Here too, is a record of all grades of each student. Catalogues and pamphlets of colleges and other institutes of higher learning are here for student inspection. Mrs. Hueston advises and guides the students as to college requirements.

The many angles of student character show up in Office III. Attendance and discipline problems of the students center here. All extra-curricular activities are supervised here and a record of the point system accurately kept. Teachers' registers are checked by Office III thus keeping a balanced record of all pupils at all times. Mr. Beddow, assistant principal, Mrs. Foster, dean of girls, and assistants Mr. Moore and Mr. Turnbull all share these varied duties.




CATHEDRAL OF THE INCARNATION GARDEN CITY



Brecher. They chose Jeanne Haste as vice-president, Robert Russell as secretary, and Susan Crandell as treasurer.





"REPORT to Office 3 at the end of the period," is the message most frequently delivered to the various rooms by the junior secretaries, the efficient helpers of Office No. 3.






The publication of a club newspaper, with Marian Brohm as editor-in-chief, was an added activity for this energetic club.

ORCHESTRA

"MUSIC must take rank as the highest of the fine arts—as the one which more than any other, ministers to human welfare." A realization of this truth is manifest whenever The Hempstead High School Symphony Orchestra announces a concert. The school auditorium is always more than filled to capacity.

Although Miss Boyle, director of the orchestra, is a talented musician and works constantly to perfect each detail, we never cease to marvel at the harmony, order and proportion of this high school orchestra. Consisting of some ninety pieces, the group is chosen from all four levels of the student body.

Few high schools in the United States can boast a complete symphony orchestra. In addition to this honor, this orchestra has the distinction of being classified among the ten outstanding school orchestras of the country.

As a benefit for the Parent-Teacher Scholarship Fund and the School Uniform Fund, the orchestra presented two concerts in December. At this time, they had the unusual experience of playing with Dr. Fritz Kurzweil, former Director of the Vienna Conservatory, as guest director.

In the February concert, a delightful part of the program was the Symphonic Suite: Scheherazade by Nicholas Rimsky-Korsakov. Salvatore Cudia was Narrator; a distinguished guest was Sebe Sarser, Cello Soloist; and our own prize solo Violinist, Raymond Gniewek, gave, as always, a brilliant performance.

With great regret, the Music Department was forced to decline an invitation for the orchestra to play at the National Conference of Music Education at Detroit, Michigan. However, they have accepted an invitation for a three-day tour including Potsdam, New York. These invitations are a fitting tribute to the excellence of the Hempstead High School's Symphony Music.







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
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Mr. Krause's track team has also added to our laurels by winning runner-up in the Sectionals last year.

One look in our trophy case will show you the lasting spirit and good deeds of Hempstead High School athletes.

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
