Friends Departed




Although her death was untimely, her memory will linger in our halls for years to come.


Foreword

No More Pencils, No More Books

THE booming voice of Mr. Arthur Wickham, long-time social studies teacher, will no longer be heard around school. After thirty-three years, the last twenty spent here, he retired to Maine, where he owns and operates a summer camp. Later his retirement will be interrupted by a trip around the world with his wife. Hailing from Carthage, New York, Mr. Wickham earned his B.S. and M.A. at New York University. He has been a past president of the Cortland State Teachers' College Alumni and Suffolk County Schoolmen's Association. During W.W. II he served as a naval officer in the Aleutians. When asked what he would miss about Hempstead High, he replied: "It's probably working with the students who go all out." And Hempstead High will miss a teacher who went all out for them.

▼OINING the Hempstead Public Schools during 1933, Miss Doty has known its three recent superintendents. She first became secretary to Dr. William Gore, then to his successor, Dr. W. Amos Kincaid, during whose administration in 1947 she was appointed District Clerk to the Hempstead Board of Education. Later she became Executive Assistant, which position she held until retirement last February during Dr. Sheldon's superintendency. Her duties have involved aspects of budget-expenditures, payrolls and bond issues for a district whose budget amounted to almost five million dollars. As District Clerk she recorded minutes for all board meetings and conducted all board correspondence. Now relieved of responsibilities of being watchdog for a multimillion dollar district budget, she anticipates leisure time for traveling, pursuing painting, gardening and other hobbies for which till now time had been limited. OLLOWING precedents established long ago, the Hempstead Board of Education continues to maintain high standards of control and management of the Hempstead Public Schools. This year's members, under the leadership of Mr. William Urquhart, Jr., President, include: Mr. John M. Serenci, Vice-President; Mr. William B. F. Lindenberger, Treasurer; Dr. Richard Pasternak, Secretary; Mr. C. H. Tunnicliffe Jones, School Attorney; and Mr. Russel G. Booth. 
Eat, Drink, And Be Merry



Duke's Laws Convention Commemoration

TEBRUARY 28, 1965, marked the 300th anniversary of the Duke's Laws Convention, the first representative assembly held in what is now New York State. The Duke's Laws Convention, which met in Hempstead, was attended by thirty-four delegates from surrounding towns. Its purpose was to adopt a code of laws presented by Governor Nicholls and ordered by the Duke of York.

Trustee Dalton R. Miller was the chairman of the 300th Anniversary Committee. Starting with an assembly at Cooper Field, his plans provided for a parade and motorcade from Cooper Field to the high school auditorium consisting of the Hempstead High School band, veteran units, Sons of the Legion, Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, and the fire department. There, following the introduction of dignitaries and honored guests, a pageant depicting the original Duke's Laws Convention was presented. The pageant was researched, written, and directed by Stephen Telinski, Hempstead High History Department chairman. The cast, dressed in appropriate, 17th century costumes, included thirty-four students and the following faculty members: Miss Abbott, Mr. Schuessler, Mr. Fish, Mr. Zara, and Mr. Pilkington. The pageant and other festivities of the day left many people reflecting about the influence which that convention in 1665 had upon following generations.






