1924 brought need for five advisers and sixteen staff members, in addition to the leader, Ira Hansen; for our school had indeed grown in size.





















YOUTH SPEAKS WITH AGE

To His right hand. . . .


Youth: When one is only seventeen

When we'll, by deed, be famous!


Age: We seize in hand the sweaty spade,

To His Right Hand. . . .



FOOTBALL 1928

NDEED is it futile to attempt to bestow upon our heroes of the gridiron a share of eulogy and praise consistent with their superb playing under Captain Hoffman. Rightly has this undefeated team been called the greatest in the history of Hempstead High School. For courage and playing ability, it is the equal of any team ever turned out on Long Island. In our enthusiasm over the team itself, however, we must not forget the man without whom it could not have achieved the success it did; our football mentor, Mr. Joseph H. Fay.

The first game of the season, as usual, was at Flushing. After a hardfought battle during three-quarters of the game, Hempstead sent Makofski over the line for a touchdown during the last five minutes of play. Murray scored the

extra point, making the score 7-0 in favor of Hempstead.

In the first home game of the season, Hempstead trounced Westbury soundly to the tune of twenty-six to nothing. Here our team demonstrated its ability to

work together, which was one of the chief reasons for its marvelous season.

The next game was with DeWitt Clinton, the team which later became the New York City champions. Hempstead won the game by a score of twenty to six.

The game with Lynbook was played on a muddy field. After having scored five touchdowns, the first team was withdrawn, and second team substituted for the remainder of the game. Due to the splendid work of Dame and Rogers, three more touchdowns were obtained, making the final score 51-0.

In the game with Bushwick, Hempstead triumphed easily by a score of 32-0. The game was marked by Hempstead's accurate aerial attack, and by the brilliant playing of Makofski, who scored three touchdowns, and the playing of Yauch and

Cheshire, who scored one apiece.

The team next journeyed to Richmond Hill. Due to the splendid fighting spirit shown by the Hempstead team, Rogers and Pearlmutter were able to score for Hempstead, making the final result 12-0. This was the fourth victory over New York City teams.

Hempstead next traveled to Glen Cove, where they overwhelmed the home team by the score of 45-7. Makofski again proved his ability by scoring three touchdowns; while Yauch, Scharfenberg and Murray made one apiece.

In the last and most important game of the Hempstead season, that with our ancient rival, Freeport, the sterling qualities of the team were displayed before the largest crowd ever assembled on the Hempstead High School field. The score at the end of the first half was 13-6 in favor of Freeport, which gained the points by an intercepted forward pass and a fumble over the goal line. In the second half the Blue and White came back with a smash, scoring three touchdowns in the third quarter, and holding Freeport scoreless for the remainder of the game.

With this victory over Freeport, Hempstead claims the football championship of Long Island. The Blue and White team also won the high scoring honors of Long Island and Greater New York scholastic elevens, the final total standing
