



Dr. WILLIAM GORE




THIS year will be the last in which we shall enjoy the privilege of having Dr. William A. Gore as Superintendent of the Hempstead Schools. Having faithfully carried out his manifold duties in this capacity for many years, he feels that he and Fluff need a well-earned rest.

During Dr. Gore's superintendency here, the Hempstead School System has expanded several times. The annex on the north end of the High School was erected, and the auditorium was added to the Washington School. Additional land was purchased for the High School athletic field and for playgrounds at the Franklin, Fulton, and Jackson Schools. Being keenly interested in music himself, he was instrumental in enlarging the music departments.

Dr. Gore gained valuable experience while he was Superintendent of Schools at Jacksonville, Illinois, and at Webster Groves, Missouri, positions which he held prior to his coming to Hempstead. His education has been very broad in scope. He first attended the University of Illinois. This was followed by courses at Columbia, Harvard, and finally, New York University, where he received his degree of Doctor of Philosophy.

Dr. Gore's congeniality has made him a real favorite of the entire community. He takes part in many civic activities and is always ready to help with promoting charitable or community drives. His interest in these civic affairs is one reason why our schools have been so successful in these drives.

We shall all miss Dr. Gore's genial companionship and intelligent supervision; we hope that he will plan to visit with us in the years to come.





Dr. RAYMOND MAURE

IT was indeed a great day for Hempstead High School when Dr. Raymond Maure became its Principal.

He began college at Wesleyan University. After two years there he went to Alfred University to obtain his Bachelor of Science Degree. Later he returned and earned the degree of Master of Arts. In a quest for greater knowledge, Dr. Maure attended Rutgers, Columbia, and New York University, where he obtained his degree of Doctor of Education.

His first position in the field of education was that of Vice-Principal and Instructor of Science in the Fulton High School, Fulton, New York. After being Principal of another school Dr. Maure came to Hempstead High to be Principal.

He established the first night training school for future aviators; these spread throughout the country. He started the first and largest school for veterans in the county and has also made many other outstanding contributions to Hempstead and to Nassau County.



OFFICE STAFFS









OFFICE I

THIS Office, together with Office IA, takes care of all school district business in matters relating to the Board of Education and the Superintendent of Schools. Office I attends to all financial matters of the district and its schools, as well as the various state reports, civil service records, rental of and repairs to school buildings and other school properties, and the cost distribution for each school.

OFFICE IA

THIS Office was established to take care of some of the work formerly performed in Office I, thereby relieving the crowded conditions there. Office IA takes care of all matters relating to working papers, the purchase of supplies for all of the Hempstead Public Schools, and all matters relating to non-resident students. The High School Activities Fund and the Cafeteria Fund are also administered through this office.



OFFICES II AND III

of our school. From the office of Dr. Maure, our Principal, come all decisions and all plans for our school, whether administrative, educational, or recreational. Under the guidance and direction of Dr. Maure, the work of the school is coordinated. Assisting him in this work are his secretaries, Mrs. Newill and Miss Dickson.

The Registrar's department of Office II maintains the scholastic and personnel records of the school, and assists students with the planning of their school programs and their preparation for entrance to the colleges of their choice. The Veterans Education Program is also planned and administered through this office.

The Staff of Office III has charge of matters pertaining to attendance, discipline, and extra-curricular activities. Mrs. Foster, the Dean of Girls, is responsible for attendance and discipline of the girls, and Mr. Beddow is in charge of the boys and directs extracurricular activities. Mr. Moore, in addition to being Administrative Assistant, is in charge of the Visual Education Program.

These students were selected from the seniors nominated by twenty-two of their fellow classmates at a meeting held a week before the election. All of those who were nominated are the president or head of some organization or club in the school.

The teachers who advise the class are Miss Barth, Mrs. Anderson, Mrs. Vincent, and Mr. Lints. These able advisers help the Seniors in solving any difficult problem and also assist in the planning of various activities during the graduating year.

A very popular event of the year was the Senior-Freshman party, at which the girls of the two extreme classes of the school become acquainted. The Freshman girls were required to wear high knee socks, bibs, and to carry rattles. Huge hair bows were worn and dolls were carried by the


The four years of high school will pass rapidly for these new Freshmen. Hempstead High will be proud of this class, and we wish them all the luck through the next three years.

The club submitted photographs of school activities for this book and also maintained the bulletin board outside of Office 2, where exceptionally good pictures were displayed.











DRAMATICS - MUSIC

MUCH of the entertainment at Hempstead High School is rendered by the Dramatics and the Music Departments.

There are two very fine dramatics clubs in Hempstead High. They are: the Footlight Club, for Juniors and Seniors; and the Curtain Call Club, for Freshmen and Sophomores. Each year the Footlight Club presents the "Footlight Frolics," a three-act play, and several one-act plays, a few of which are presented at assembly programs. Much credit is due Miss Boyle and her assistants for their efforts, which resulted in the music groups of Hempstead High School being classified as one of the ten best high school music departments in the country.

We are proud to say that the orchestra, under the able direction of Miss Boyle, has rightfully achieved success, and that it is complete in symphonic instrumentation. We would almost say that our orchestra is the school's "pride and joy."




As the conclusion to another busy year the Choir will again take part in the Baccalaureate services at Graduation.






opening battle.

BASKETBALL




The 1946 squad went through the complete season without marring the slate by so much as one scratch. They then completed the season by winning the South Shore Athletic League Championship for the third consecutive year and the New York Section 8 Championship for the second year running.

As for individual champions, Hempstead's private "Mercury," Dick Neubauer, bowed only twice while running fourteen times during the season, breaking the South Shore record for the 220-yard

dash with a beautiful 22.4. Al Kohanowich highjumped into the headlines by tying for a first in the South Shore meet during his first Varsity year.

If the saying that "A team is only as good as the brains behind it" holds true, then the ability of our track coach, Mr. Krause, has certainly been proven by the fact that he came to Hempstead three years ago and, starting with almost nothing, built up a team that has been the champion in its class for each one of those years.

The students and the faculty extend their heartiest congratulations to the 1946 squad upon its grand job of making the Hub team outstanding in the Spring sports. We are also looking forward to an equally successful 1947 team, for the prospects look promising.



BOWLING

A N opportunity to bowl regularly and match one's skill against an opposing player are two features offered to members of Hempsted High School's bowling team.

To bolster a squad of four returning team members, Mr. Windt, coach, observed the hooks and bowling knowledge of twenty-five new prospects.

A 5-0 shutout over Mepham featured the Tigers' initial victory. A highly-rated Sewanhaka quintet was then defeated 3-2. Two successive 5-0 shutouts over Oceanside and Long Beach respectively, manifested the power of the roaring Tiger team.

An improved Long Beach squad finally halted the winning streak of the Hempstead High bowlers. The score was 4-1. The Hub keglers found the strike zone in their next encounter and handed Baldwin a 5-0 whitewashing.

In league competition five points is the maximum amount a team can win. The flying Tiger team demonstrated their ability to accomplish this feat as they trounced Freeport, Woodmere, and South Side by successive 5-0 scores.

Under the expert guidance of the Messrs. Voorhies, Dale, and Monsell this year's Tiger team proved that it can equal the excellently efficient records of other great H.H. rifle teams.

Opening at Jamaica with a non-league engagement, Hempstead defeated Jamaica 890-886. The first league match resulted in a win over Garden City. The score was 902-843. Keeping in the win column, the Tiger combination went on to outshoot a highly-rated Chaminade squad 901-892. The next two encounters were a 896-815 thrashing of Freeport and a 903-814 score over the Indians of Sewanhaka. At Valley Stream, Hempstead took a 886-858 decision over the Gateway Sextet.

The present aspiration of our Hempstead rifle team is to participate in the Sectional Eight and Long Island Press Championships.





GREEK



THE Greek Games, known also as the Olympic Games, originated in Greece in the year 776 B.C. These games were named after Olympia, a famous Greek soldier. He made a noted run that took many days, in order to bring a message to the Greek king. Olympia died after he gave the scroll to the king. The Olympic Games were one of the four great national festivals and were usually celebrated on the plain of Olympia, near Athens, in the midsummer of the year. No women were allowed to participate in this festival, and only Greeks of pure descent were allowed at any time to enter in this event until the conquest of Greece by the Romans. The winners of these games were awarded a garland of wild olive, and great fame was brought to their families and their cities. These games died out during the fourth century A.D. and were not revived until 1896. Since then the games have been held every four years. The Olympic Games held in Berlin in 1936 were the last ones, the contests having been discontinued during the war. The next Olympic Games are scheduled to be held in London in 1948. All the nations except Germany and Japan are expected to participate in these events.

After the sporting events laurel wreaths were placed on the heads of each of the winners. This was the conclusion of another very successful year in these ancient games.


