In Memoriam

MARGARET BEIGHLEY



ARGARET Beighley, General Science instructor at Hempstead High School, died on February 20, 1964. Her friendly smile and warm personality many times offered the first sincere welcome to Hempstead's incoming freshmen. Both in the classroom and in extracurricular activities, she was always known for her energy and enthusiasm. She served as the advisor for the Horseback Riding Club for many years and annually assisted with Greek Games. The women faculty members enjoyed her company during their weekly bowling matches.

Among the honors given to Miss Beighley was her selection as an exchange teacher during the 1952-53 school year. She enjoyed her position in an English girls' school on the Thames River as it provided a look into a different kind of secondary education. While in England, she witnessed

the coronation procession of Queen Elizabeth II, saw the opening of Parliament, visited the royal yacht, and was privileged to meet the Duke of Edinborough and the Queen Mother. Although she was fond of England, with the exception of its foggy atmosphere, she was happy to return to Hempstead High.

Miss Beighley was born in Connellsville, Pennsylvania. After having been graduated from Bethany College in West Virginia and having obtained her M.A. from New York University, she then furthered her studies at Pennsylvania State College. She taught for a short while in Fairchance, Pennsylvania, and then came in 1933 to Prospect School when it was the junior high school. Later Miss Beighley joined the staff of the Science Department and has been with us ever since.


Even though the citizens of our high school derive from varied backgrounds and environments, we live and work together to create a functioning metropolis of which we're indeed proud.



Although he'll miss his pleasant association with students and faculty, he's looking forward to a more leisurely life in a milder climate, playing golf, and continuing with his many hobbies.






Top Brass


Hoopsters In Play-Offs Tenth Year In a Row






They Get Their Kicks From Wielding Sticks


The Olympians





Spotlight on Sports




